#### A Healthy Community Requires Strong Financial Planning

Every year, the City of North Vancouver must balance its budget to deliver the services you rely on, such as parks, roads, recreation, public safety, and more. The budget shows how money is collected through taxes, fees, and grants, and how it is invested back into the community. As part of the City's Five-Year Financial Plan, the annual budget is guided by Council's Strategic Plan, ensuring accountability today and planning for a healthy, thriving, and resilient community into the future.





#### **2025 TAX DISTRIBUTION**

In 2025 an average residential property assessed at \$1,451,726 will pay \$4,618 in property taxes. As illustrated below, approximately 42% of taxes collected were on behalf of other regional agencies like Translink and the Provincial government (school tax). The City continually seeks new revenue streams and capacity-building opportunities to limit the need for any property tax increases.

#### **LOOKING AHEAD TO 2026**

The City's budget is shaped by a mix of pressures. Some factors, such as inflation and reduced development revenues create increased budget pressures, while others, including new fee revenues and tax roll growth, help to offset these pressures. These factors shape how much money is available each year and what trade-offs need to be made.



## **INCREASING BUDGET PRESSURE**

- RCMP costs
- Decreased revenue from development
- Infrastructure renewal and construction inflation
- Metro Vancouver's rates driven by the North Shore Wastewater Treatment Plant (NSWWT) budget being increased to \$3.86 billion
- Salaries and benefits from collective agreements

### **DECREASING BUDGET PRESSURE**

- Improving non-tax revenues from fees and charges
- Tax roll growth from development
- Curb Access and Parking Plan (CAPP) revenue to fund public safety programs and asset management including road and sidewalk improvements
- Updated Development Costs Charges (DCC's) to fund capital projects
